


Three Assertions


Assertion 1



Research to help frame your thinking

For children to do well in school:

- Expectations matter
- Parent involvement can help

Meta-Analyses: The Effectiveness of Homework

- The value of homework for younger children vs. older children
- What about ideas of habit and discipline?
- Feeling a sense of competence and finishing a task or project (think puzzles, Legos, cooking)
- Specific, intentional teaching is the best homework tutoring

Homework Design

- What can "good" homework look like?
- Highlights of Interactive Homework bridging the home and school literacies
- Could this be a resource for adult learners to share and discuss with teachers and administrators when meeting about homework?

Thinking of your role as a leader/teacher/facilitator/partner in learning

Consider a perspective from outside of dominant culture: programming that affirms diverse family literacy practices with the goal of transforming communities into better places for everyone.

Possible Program Structures

WHO

- A group leader who can stimulate discussion and inquiry in an adult learning group, and facilitate problem-posing, research and possible actions
- A couple crackerjack volunteer tutors who can work with children of different ages on homework and steer them to fun projects and activities outside of homework

WHEN



- Some models recommend a 10 week timeframe
- How does a once-a-week, 1.5 2 hour meeting sound?
- Would after-school or weekend hours work, with a snack beforehand and dinner (or lunch) afterward?
