Why Rainbow Families (LGBTQ Families)?

- * Over 110,000 same-sex couples are raising children in almost every county (96%) in the U.S.
 - Areas with low numbers of same-sex couples and LGBTQ singles without children.
- * Approximately 2 million children are raised in LGBTQ families that most often live in rural areas.

- * Surrogacy
- * Child birth
- * Single LGBTQ parents/caregivers

Books as Mirrors & Windows


It is important for the self-esteem of LGBTQ children and children with LGBT caregivers to see themselves and their families in the books they encounter






Informational Needs of Rainbow Families

- * Developmentally appropriate, high-quality print and digital materials that normalize the experiences of LGBTQ families.
- * Current, accurate information about local organizations serving LGBTQ families.
- * Language in library programs inclusive of LGBTQ families
- * Opportunities to learn about LGBTQ individuals via library displays, collections, and programs.
- * Confidentiality in patron records and discretion when helping LGBTQ family members locate materials
- * Ability to locate LGBTQ materials within the library's catalog and collections





Creating Welcoming Spaces for LGBTQ Families

- * Recognize and address personal prejudices among library staff.
- * Respectful language in programs, readers advisory, and all services.
- * Confront instances of teasing and bullying between children, parents, or library staff.
- * Encourage LGBTQ caregivers to volunteer and participate in children's library programs.



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Creating Welcoming Spaces (Continued)


- * Collaborate with community agencies serving Rainbow Families.
- * Create visual displays and bulletin boards inclusive of all families.
- Integrate LGBTQ children's books into regular storytimes and arrange on bookshelves alongside other children's books.
- * Examine library materials for stereotypes and biases such as gender stereotypes, sex role stereotypes, homophobia, etc.







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"Out and Proud" Program Examples

- ***Events in conjunction with LGBTQ Pride**
- *Outreach at Rainbow Family Events: picnics, PFLAG meetings, etc.
- *Adoption workshops inclusive of LGBTQ topics.
- *Family film series with gay-friendly children's films: Oliver Button is a Star, Buster's Outdoor Journey's, etc.

"Under the Radar" Subversive & Inclusive Programming

- * One of the best ways to serve children and caregivers in LGBTQ families.
- * You may not want to offer "Rainbow Storytimes" that single out LGBTQ families.
 - ✓ Fear of embarrassing Rainbow Families
 - ✓ Perceived programs being only for a specific population


Why Subversive (Inclusive) Storytimes?

- * Validates the existence of children and caregivers in Rainbow Families
- * Subverts views in the storyhour that all families have a mom and a dad and/or are heterosexual.
- * Normalizes the experiences of children and adults in Rainbow Families, providing a window for children and caregivers in other types of families.



How to be Subversive

- * Change pronouns while reading a book with androgynous animal characters
- * Change character names to become androgynous: Jaime, Rene, Michele, Pat, Chris, etc.
- * Use terms such as "parent" or "caregiver" instead of "mother" or "father"
- * Using books with single parents
- * Share books with ambiguous family constructs: multiple parents, "friends" expressing love, etc.





More Subversive Suggestions

- * Share "gender bending" books from all genres.
- * Invite "out of the box" guest speakers: Male teachers and nurses, female construction workers and business owners, etc.
- * Start a book and allow children to conclude the ending by inserting their own personal experiences via a written, oral, or visual story.



Considerations in Selecting LGBTQ- Themed Children's Materials

- * How a child reacts when she/he learns that an important person in her/his life is LGBTQ. (Or, how children embrace their own LGBTQ identity)
- * How the sexual orientation of a LGBTQ character is explained.
- * How the narrative presents the lives of LGBTQ characters and families.
- * How LGBTQ characters are portrayed in illustrations.
- * How gender identity and gender diversity are described.




Messages about Rainbow Families depicted in storytime materials


- Are boys "sissies" if they play with dolls, dress up, or have mainly girl friends?
- * Are girls shown outdoors and active?
- * Are females only depicted in dresses and in female-stereotyped roles such as housewife, nurse, mother, etc.?

- * Are males depicted as fathers, elementary teachers, nurses, dancers, etc.?
- * Are families with 2 dads, 2 moms, or single parents represented?
- * Are same-sex parents stigmatized in your materials?
- Are gender nonconforming children present?

Choosing Counter-LGBTQ Materials?

- * A balanced library collection of LGBTQ materials does NOT include anti-gay materials.
- * The balance to LGBTQ materials are heterosexual materials which libraries already have a preponderance of.

MIRRORS FOR THEIR LIVES, WINDOWS TO THE WORLD: LITERATURE FOR STUDENTS

- Books provide an important mirror for children to see themselves reflected in the world around them.
 Books also provide a window into the lives of others and expand students' personal experiences.
- Children who feel that they belong and are welcome in school are more highly motivated and engaged in learning and more committed to school.²
- Books can help students understand that families are unique while at the same time they share many common values, beliefs and traditions.




